Content update: Screened an excerpt from American Graduate half hour segment on Family engagement policy and implementation. Group viewed video created by Media Arts Charter School addressing youth mental health. Tool kits will be made available by the school. Filming was done in a skit type scenario, a terrific example of youth produced messages for other kids.

Conversation about education and employment:

- What can we do to help make the bridge from the classroom to the "real world?"

Discussion: Teachers and students need workshops on education and the workforce. According to the Department of Workforce Solutions, health care is the biggest industry that still has increasing jobs available. David's experience at Horizon Academy West is that resume skills are not being learned. He has trouble hiring people at \$20 to lead summer learning programs at the school. He cannot find qualified workers and found that even a sophomore in college cannot write a proper resume. It is not just the spelling and grammar but the process and critical thinking needed. How can we pay them \$20 an hour and they can't write a resume when three others that can would be more than happy to make that wage? There are not enough local jobs available for the kids to migrate into after graduation. What are we training them to be?

Training needs to align better with the work that is available. We need to make a connection with the employers. The can be invited to come into the classroom and talk about resume skills, attire and other topics that help make kids employable but schools don't address. Students could make a field trip to a business to see how work is done and talk with workers. Field trips to UNM or CNM campus could give them an expectation that college is possible.
